

Dr. Meyer is a clinical and forensic psychiatrist practicing in Cambridge, Massachusetts and a senior clinical supervisor in the Harvard Longwood Residency Program. Dr. Meyer trained in general adult psychiatry, with further subspecialty training in consultation liaison psychiatry and psychopharmacology. Dr. Meyer is Board Certified in Psychiatry with Added Qualifications in Forensic Psychiatry. In addition to his adult clinical practice, he is an Assistant Clinical Professor of Psychiatry at Harvard Medical School and has been a member of the Medical School teaching faculty for 27 years. He is co-author of The Supervisory Encounter (Yale Press 1995). He has made numerous local and national academic presentations on teaching psychiatry, teaching difficult trainees and on the risk management issues of collaborative mental health care. He is a board examiner for The American Board of Psychiatry and Neurology.

He is the Associate Director of Forensic Psychiatry at Beth Israel Deaconess Medical Center and a senior associate in The Program in Psychiatry and Law at Massachusetts Mental Health Center. He serves as co-chair of the Ethics Committee of the Massachusetts Psychiatric Society. He is a Distinguished Fellow of the American Psychiatric Association. In addition to his forensic interests in civil (competency, psychological injury and illness, medical malpractice) and employment conflicts (psychiatric fitness for duty, disability), Dr. Meyer has been a frequent forensic psychiatric evaluator of health care professionals for The Massachusetts Board of Registration in Medicine, Physician Health Services, hospitals, clinics, health care training programs and health care graduate schools. He has authored numerous articles on the clinical risk management of collaborative mental health treatment. Dr. Meyer is the first author of Psychiatric Malpractice and the Standard of Care in The Textbook of Forensic Psychiatry, American Psychiatric Publishing, 2004. He is a manuscript reviewer for The Journal of the American Academy of Psychiatry and Law, for Psychiatric Services and for American Psychiatric Publishing. He has made numerous presentations on risk management of psychiatric practice and on forensic fitness for duty assessments.
